Minister's Gleamings

Do you ever marvel how your stream of thought winds its way from one place to another? I started at Alfred Hitchcock and ended up at Ralph Waldo Emerson. Here's how it happened.

Saturday night there was an Alfred Hitchcock film festival on TV. I came in on *Rear Window*, which is my all-time favorite. Next up was *The Birds*, and although it's not actually a very good movie it's my pseudo-favorite in a campy, cult film sort of way. Tippi Hedren, playing a spoiled socialite, goes to the town of Bodega Bay in pursuit of Rod Taylor. There she finds herself embroiled in a never explained attack on the populace by the local birds (and seemingly all their friends from out of town). Tippi does not cope well. When she opens the bedroom door to find that the birds pecked a four-foot hole in the roof and had taken possession of the room, does she gasp and slam the door shut? No. Does she turn and flee leaving the door open for them to follow her into the house? No. She steps into the room and closes the door behind her.

Now, this annoyed me because I occasionally make reference to feeling like Tippi Hedren when the flocks of grackles come swarming all over my birdfeeders, and I really don't think I care to liken myself to the character that acts like the one who always twists her ankle running from the dinosaurs and says, "No, go on without me." Perhaps it was my Calvinist upbringing or coming of age during the feminist movement, but I put a fair amount of value on being able to cope, on self-reliance. But being able to cope, in my definition, doesn't mean having to do it alone and that's where the folks of Bodega Bay make their mistake. They all try to battle the birds alone. They never form into the community they profess to be to defend themselves or others. Problem is that Rod Taylor's the only one who's anywhere near competent at being self-reliant.

Well, from there it's just a hop, skip and a jump to Ralph Waldo Emerson who wrote the famous essay "Self-Reliance." Emerson speaks about the use of reason and the right of conscience, in short the self-reliance of the mind rather than the self-reliance of action called for in Bodega Bay. But I think Emerson would argue that mental conviction is the first step to action. If you haven't read this particular essay you are probably familiar with some of its more famous lines like, "a foolish consistency is the hobgoblin of little minds," "imitation is suicide," or "whoso would be a man, must be a nonconformist." Those lines pretty well sum up the theme of this essay, which expresses the prevailing attitude in the Unitarianism of Emerson's day and for that matter the individualism of America's founding fathers, both attitudes that we are heirs to. While I am too inculcated with that attitude to disagree regarding the use of individual conscience, I do have to point out that when it comes to action we may want to take more account of the common good built by common purpose. Take a lesson not only from Emerson, but from Tippi—a foolish reliance on self-reliance is no reliance at all.

I think we're all lucky that I turned off the TV when *Psycho* came on.

Choir Participates in Banning

Banned Books Week: Celebrating the Freedom to Read, is observed during the last week of September each year. Observed since 1982, this annual American Library Association event reminds Americans not to take this precious democratic freedom for granted. This year, 2007, marked BBW's 26th anniversary (September 29 through October 6). The Rev. Holly Baylies brought this event to the congregation's attention via a sermon entitled "Banned in Boston" on September 30th.

Sometimes the music program is able to match its selections to the theme of the morning. Happily (we think) for the congregation, the choir trotted out two rousing songs that were a good fit. The choir celebrated Banned Book Week, taking a cue from the fact that various translations and editions of the Bible have been suppressed over the ages starting as early as 553 A.D. An anthem of a biblical nature that we're rather fond of is the joyous finale from the musical GODSPELL: "Long Live God/Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord" by Stephen Schwartz. The choir was joined by Janet Schuchter for this song. Additionally, we chose a Marc Shaiman arrangement of the traditional sacred melody "Hail Holy Queen". Many of you probably recognized it as the Whoppi Goldberg version from the hit film Sister Act. The Rev. Holly herself pitched in to help us out on this piece, playing the tambourine!

Group A Status

As stated previously, we have three sub-groups of Group A, Grants, Fund-Grants group has drawn up a beautiful history of the church – both the building and some of the more renowned members over the years. We have submitted several grant proposals and have been asked for additional information from three of the foundations from which we are seeking grants. We are optimistic that we will be seeing some awards by the end of the year.

See elsewhere in the Gleam for details on the LTC/SOS Concert, which raised \$3400 for the building fundraising and Capital Campaign. There are tentative plans to have a Valentine's Day concert with classical music and champaign for lovers, but a formal proposal must be brought before the board before further planning can move forward.

Finally, the capital campaign sub-committee is currently on hold. Since none of the members of the Group A have ever been involved with, let alone run, a capital campaign, we feel strongly we cannot move forward on this without assistance from the UUA. We have done a lot of research and are sure this is the best course of action. However, we do not want to start a large capital campaign until we can present to the public what, exactly we are seeking funds for. If we get funds from donors and then change the plans, we run the risk of having the donors demand refunds for their contributions and this is a problem we want to avoid.

Option C" Committee Update

The members of the Option C committee are in the process of collecting information about the other UU churches in the area to see if there are some that we might want to consider merging / blending with. We have also attended the Sunday services at several of them.

If you are interested in helping to estimate the costs of building a new church somewhere in the Wakefield / Saugus area, or know of someone who might be able to help us figure it out, please let me know.

Our next meeting will be held in late Oct or early Nov. Please let me know if you are interested in attending, and I will contact you once the date is finalized.

LTC/SOS Concert a Huge Success!!!!

Thank you to all who volunteered for the first Group A Fundraiser. In spite of competing with one of the nicest days of the year, the Patriots AND the Red Sox, we had good attendance and plenty of fun was had by all. We brought in \$2,200 in ticket sales. We sold 92 spaghetti dinners for \$380 in gross sales. The raffle of donated CDs from the artists netted us \$194, and the concession stand brought in an additional \$350. An additional \$300 n donations were left in the donations box.

It was a lot of work but well worth the effort, bringing in a total of approximately \$3,400 for The 326 Main Street Trust. This figure may be a little higher or lower since some of the more expensive supplies still need to be reimbursed and the Linden Tree Coffeehouse is purchasing the leftover soda and water.

All we can say is WOW. It really reminds us of why we are all together when you see so many people coming together to really make something happen. I cannot even count all the volunteers from the church and from the Linden Tree Coffee House who were there, some from setting up of the first chair to packing up the last of the sound equipment. So many volunteers, many of whom chose to miss the Patriot's game and a beautiful 75 degree Indian Summer day, really made the day run completely smoothly. Special Kudos to the Kitchen staff, who were stuck in a hot kitchen all day preparing a really yummy dinner for 100 people, Liz Freeman and Ed Britt, who booked the acts and organized the sound people, and John Swanson for pulling it all together.

Let's reaffirm our promise that no matter what happens with the building we will all stick together because together we make something wonderful.

News From The Board of Management

We will be making some very important decisions in the coming months regarding our church building as well as the path our congregation will take. To this end the BOM sought to continue discussions throughout the congregation. As you recall the congregation identified three groups last spring to focus their attentions on the future of our congregation. On October 14, 2007 we held the first of two meetings for these groups to relay their current status and what they will be working on in the next months. We have scheduled an additional meeting to continue these important discussions on November 18, 2007.

The groups were identified as group A, group B and group C. Group A is investigating funding options for repairing and general maintenance of our building. Group B is investigating potential partnerships that would reduce the direct cost of building maintenance. While Group C is investigating a wide variety of options with a focus on alternatives to staying in our current church building.

Group A reported that they have further broken down into three groups. One group to work on grants, one to work on a capitol campaign and the third to run general fund raising. Several grants have been sent out and we awaiting further developments. The group working on capitol campaigns can not move forward until a decision is made by the congregation on whether we will repair the steeple. The fund raising group has already held their first event, the all day Linden Tree concert. Another fund raiser is being considered for February.

Group B has reported that the primary group they were hoping to work with on a partnership is not prepared to move forward at this time.

Group C is investigating many options. The group has visited other churches in the area, they have considered options regarding renting space and they are prepared to work with the Unitarian Universalist church of Saugus.

Following these presentations a number of individuals contributed their points of view on a wide array of topics from discussing what the groups had reported to their individual hopes and perspectives. Discussions ranged from building a green church to converting our current church into a green church. These and other discussions will continue at our next meeting on November 18, 2007. I can not state more strongly that it is important for you to attend these discussions so that we can move our congregation to a point where we can sustain ourselves while nurturing the spiritual needs of each and every one of us. It is my belief that we can only move toward an expected future if we all work together toward goals we set for ourselves.

Wandering and Wondering

We have been wandering around America learning about the Native or Pre-Colombian cultures and their senses of spirituality. We are halfway through our exploration of Native Spirituality and Culture. If you would like to know the different nations we have been learning about, take a look at the maps displayed during coffee hour. In November we will be learning about the Dine/Navajo, the local Wampanoags, and celebrating the Thanksgiving Communion in an Intergenerational Service. At our thanksgiving service, we will be sharing the Guest at Your Program, which is run through the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee.

I have been doing some wandering of my own. Last weekend I went over to Winchester and attended a training in Spirit Play, and it led me to wondering. Spirit Play is a Montessori based educational method specifically designed for the UU RE Classroom. Some of the main goals of the program are to invite children to wonder about "the big questions," to learn and understand our seven principles as seven promises that we keep, and to invite our youth into an environment that is tailored to their learning and working styles.

If you would like to do some wandering of your own, I invite you to learn more about the younger members of the congregation and what we have been doing downstairs. We have a library of Native Stories for children that parents are welcome to check out, just make sure you sign out the books. Additionally, I have brought in some of my own literature on Native Americans for older readers that I am happy to share. If you are a singer, ask Jeff Workman about joining the Intergenerational Choir.
